Centre for Arctic Health (CAH) Background for Arctic Health Research at Aarhus University

- In 2001 the Centre for Environmental Medicine (today Centre) for Arctic Health) was founded as a formal research Centre to draw attention to the scientific activities of Arctic environmental medicine, which had taken place at Aarhus University since the end of the 1970's.



- The Centre is located at the Department of Public Health, and has cooperation with representatives in Nuuk at
 - the Queen Ingrid Hospital
 - the Institute for Nurses and Health Research, Ilisimatusarfik
 - the Greenland Institute of National Resources
- In 2012 the cross-faculty Arctic Research Centre (ARC) was established at Aarhus Úniversity as Jesper Madsen already introduced
